# Recovery Fact Sheet

## Navigating the Road to Recovery

- Public Assistance funding approved for state and local governments in North Carolina has surpassed \$100 million dollars for Hurricane Florence. The money helps reimburse government entities and certain non-profits for the cost of debris removal, emergency protective measures and permanent repair work to damaged or destroyed infrastructure.
- Total federal assistance approved for North Carolina's Hurricane Florence recovery has topped \$1.2 billion, including FEMA grants, National Flood Insurance Program payments, and U.S. Small Business Administration loans.

## Hurricane Florence Recovery Update

### *Scope*

- **34** counties designated for Individual Assistance
- **51** counties designated for Public Assistance (Categories A-G)
- All Hurricane Florence shelters closed Nov. 9 (peak population 21,272 on Sept. 15)
- Total state and federal resources approved: More than **\$1.2 billion**
- As of March 5, FEMA Individuals and Households grants: **\$128.3 million** approved for **34,563** homeowners and renters
  - Housing Assistance approved: **\$105.8 million**
  - Other Needs Assistance approved: **\$22.5 million**
- As of March 11, Direct Housing Units licensed in: **686**
- **Transitional Sheltering Assistance: 146** households with **436** household members checked into TSA-participating hotels.
- FEMA inspectors in the field: **5**
- FEMA inspections completed: 103,724 (99 percent) of 103,774 assigned
- As of March 4, U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) disaster loans approved: **\$395.4 million** for **9,869** applicants
  - **\$331.9 million** in loans approved for **8,930** homeowners and renters
  - **\$63.5 million** in loans approved for **939** business owners
- The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP):

- Estimated claims paid: **\$593.1 million**
- NFIP claims filed: **15,047**
- **\$101.8 million** in Public Assistance funding has been obligated for Hurricane Florence.

### SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans

The deadline to return SBA economic injury disaster loan applications is **June 14, 2019**.

### Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA)

The [Transitional Sheltering Assistance](#) program provides short-term hotel stays to survivors who were displaced from their homes and need shelter while they look for longer-term housing. FEMA and the state continue to work with survivors to address their individual housing needs. Assistance continues even after short-term programs come to an end. Disaster Case Management, FEMA housing assistance, Sheltering and Temporary Essential Power and local organizations remain available to help residents affected by Hurricane Florence.

### Direct Temporary Housing Assistance

FEMA is providing Direct Temporary Housing Assistance in **13** counties: **Bladen, Brunswick, Carteret, Columbus, Craven, Duplin, Jones, Lenoir, New Hanover, Onslow, Pamlico, Pender** and **Robeson**. Travel trailers and manufactured housing units are provided for eligible households displaced from their homes.

### Sheltering and Temporary Essential Power (STEP)

The [Sheltering and Temporary Essential Power](#) (STEP) provides basic, partial repairs to make homes safe, clean and secure to help North Carolina homeowners with minor damage from Hurricane Florence get back in their home quickly. The deadline to request participation in the program has passed.

### **Disaster Tax Relief**

Survivors of Hurricane Florence may qualify for tax relief from the Internal Revenue Service. Taxpayers may be eligible for deadline extensions to file returns or pay taxes, and may be able to claim qualified disaster losses. The IRS may waive fees and expedite requests from survivors. ### **Unmet Needs**

FEMA works closely with state, federal, faith-based and voluntary agency partners. Survivors who do not qualify for FEMA disaster assistance may call **2-1-1**, the statewide information and referral service for basic unmet needs—such as food or cleaning supplies and help to pay utility bills and child-care expenses.

### **Public Assistance**

#### *Hurricane Florence*

- FEMA's Public Assistance program provides grants to state, local and tribal governments, and to certain types of private nonprofit organizations so that communities can quickly respond to and recover from major disasters or emergencies.
- The following **51** counties are eligible to apply for all categories of Public Assistance: Alamance, Alleghany, Anson, Ashe, Beaufort, Bertie, Bladen, Brunswick, Cabarrus, Carteret, Chatham, Columbus, Craven, Cumberland, Dare, Davidson, Duplin, Granville, Greene, Guilford, Harnett, Hoke, Hyde, Johnston, Jones, Lee, Lenoir, Madison, McDowell, Montgomery, Moore, New Hanover, Onslow, Orange, Pamlico, Pender, Person, Pitt, Polk, Randolph, Richmond, Robeson, Rowan, Sampson, Scotland, Stanly, Tyrrell, Union, Wayne, Wilson and Yancey.

#### *Tropical Storm Michael*

- The following **21** counties are eligible for all categories of Public Assistance for Tropical Storm Michael damage that occurred between Oct. 10 and 12, 2018, under declaration DR-4412-NC: **Alamance, Brunswick, Caswell, Chatham, Dare, Davidson, Davie, Forsyth, Granville, Hyde, Iredell, McDowell, Montgomery, Orange, Person, Randolph, Rockingham, Stokes, Surry, Vance, and Yadkin Counties.**
